### Will Boost North Platte.

Thirty-five representative citizens met at the court room last evening and made the preliminary move toward organizing a commercial body. City clerk Temple, who was one of four or five instrumental in calling the meeting, stated the object, and upon motion J. J. Halligan was elected chairman and Mr. Temple secretary. In taking the chair Mr. Halligan spoke of the lack of concentration of effort on the part of North Platte citizens, and the need of united action in order that this city might occupy the commercial position her location warrants. He was followed by Messrs. VanDenhoof, Bare, Keefe, Bratt, McDonald, Forbes, Keliher, Tout and others, all of whom argued the need of a commercial organization and urged its formation.

Upon motion the chairman was instructed to appoint a committee on constitution and by-laws, and Mr. Halligan will name the committee today. A committee composed of Messrs. Bare, McDonald and Forbes was appointed to solicit members, and an effort will be made to secure a membership of 150 or 200. Thirty-five names were attached to the membership roll last evening.

Another meeting will be held at the court house next Thursday evening, when the committee on constitution and by-laws will report and a permanent organization effected. All citizens interested in the well fare of North Platte are urged to attend.
