President's Business Methods

Washington Post: No better evidence can be given as to the success of the business side of President Taft's administration than the announcement that for the first year since 1907 the United States treasury has a surplus.

The closeness with which the estimates were prepared shows clearly how well President Taft has impressed upon his subordinates the necessity for estimating accurately. The old method was for the head of a bureau to give a guess and then add a few millions, while Congress knowing the department method, gave another guess and slashed off a few millions.

With the president's reform in effect at the present time, the work of Congress in the future will be simplified. Appropriation committees can accept it as a fact that the department chiefs have pared down their estimates to the very bone.

The size of the corporation tax receipts is an evidence that business is booming. The tax is dependent on the amount of earnings and it is clear, therefore, that the earnings must have been large.

Unitarian Hall Title

Dear Sir:—When reading the Rev. R. B. Fawcett's communication regarding the Unitarian Hall title in your last issue, I thought that the city attorney, and citizens anxious to acquire the site of that building for the erection of a city hall, had better go slow.

The property rightfully belongs to the American Unitarian Association, as it was legally decided to it; for it contributed liberally towards the erection of the building, and in early days aided the society in many ways. When the North Platte Unitarian Society divided down to a few members, the few combined, and disputed the title of the American Unitarian Association to the property.

In conclusion, I would suggest that the city attorney communicate with the Union Pacific land office, and the American Unitarian Association, whose address is Boston street, Boston. I know little about law, but am aware that law is sometimes one thing, and justice another; and after all, it may be possible that a district judge has power to give permission to sell or encumber property decided to a society in like manner to that of the North Platte Unitarian Society.
