Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Gilbert, who were married last week at Cozad, returned yesterday morning from Denver where they spent their honeymoon.

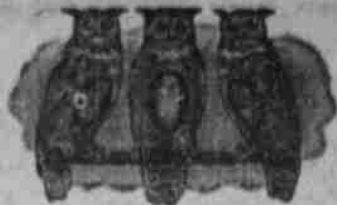

Home from Training School.

Mrs. M. K. Duke returned Monday from attending the National Training School of Spirella Corsetieres held at Meadville, Pa., August 1st to 11th, inclusive.
