Miss Mae Munger, of Hershey, visited with Miss Eileen Flynn this week.

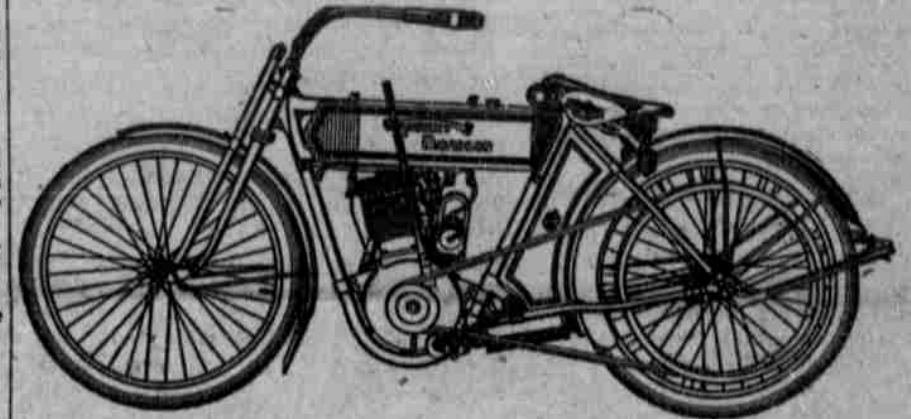
