They're Off in the Morning.

Promptly at eight o'clock tomorrow morning the North Platte boosters leave on their excursion to the west part of the state, and a highly enjoyable as well as profitable trip is anticipated. In order that no booster may oversleep a siren whistle will be blown at intervals between seven and eight o'clock, and a few minutes before the latter hour every member is expected to be at the depot. The Brady and Maxwell representatives will come up tonight, and the Hershey and Sutherland representatives will board the train at those stations. 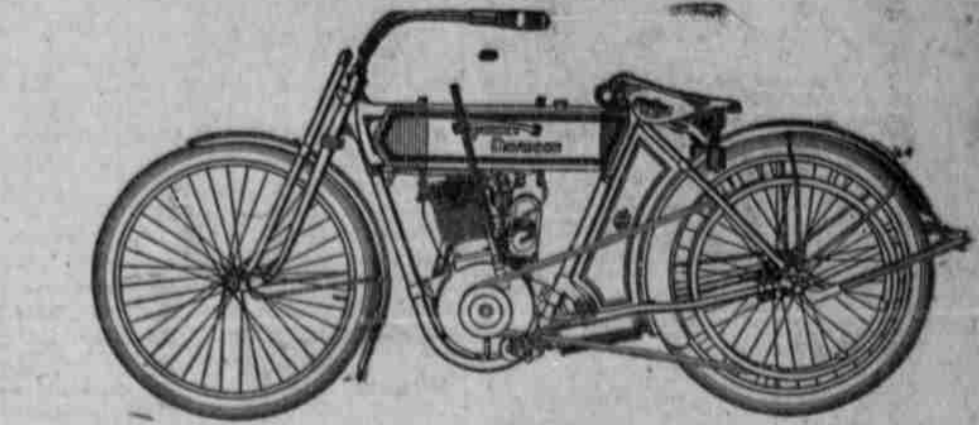
Two records were broken by the South Omaha live stock market yesterday. All records for a single day's receipts of cattle were smashed by the arrival of 16,346 head, the former high record being 15,663 head on September 5, 1910. The previous high record, made on September 26, 1910, for the largest number of cars of all kinds of live stock, 827, was broken yesterday when 844 cars arrived.

Ordinance No. 11.

An ordinance regarding the construction of sidewalk as follows: Beginning at the curb line on west "B" Street, and from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of South Vine Street, along and in front of the east side of Lots 1, 2, 3 and four of Block 3 of Miller's Addition to the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, to the curb line on the South Side "A" Street, and beginning at the curb line on the north side of First Street, from thence in an northerly direction along the west side of Vine Street, along and in front of the east side of Lot 8 in Block 177 of the said City of North Platte; also beginning at the curb line of the north side of Ninth Street and running in an northerly direction along the west side of North Willow Street, along the east side of Lots 8 and 1 of Block 50 to the curb line on the south side of Tenth Street; and beginning at the curb line on the north side of Tenth Street, from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of Willow Street, along the east side of Lots 8 and 1 of Block 41 to the curb line on the south side of Eleventh Street; also beginning at the curb line on the north side of "C" Street, from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of Elm Street, along and in front of Lots 4, 3, 2, 1 of Block 3 of South Park Addition to the city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska to the curb line on the south side of "B" Street; also beginning at a line on the south side of East Sixth Street and from thence in a southerly direction along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 137 to the curb line on the North Side of East Fourth Street, and beginning at the curb line on the South Side of East Fifth Street, thence in a Southerly direction along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 110 to the curb line on the north side of East Fifth Street, and beginning at the curb line on the South Side of East Fourth Street, thence in a Southerly direction along the east side

of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 140 to the curb line on the north side of East Third Street, and beginning at the curb line on the South Side of East Third Street, thence in a southerly direction, along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 137 to the curb line on the north side of East Fourth Street, and beginning at the curb line on the south side of East Fourth Street thence in a southerly direction along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 140 to the curb line on the north side of East Third Street, and beginning at the curb line on the east side of Third Street thence in a southerly direction, along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 167, to the curb line on the north side of East Second Street, all in the original plat of the City of North Platte, Nebraska; also beginning at the curb line on West "C" Street, and from thence in a southerly direction along the east side of South Vine Street, along and in front of Lots 5, 6, 7 and 8 in Block 10 of Miller's Addition; also beginning at the curb line on North Locust Street, and from thence in a westerly direction along the north side of East Tenth Street, along in front of Lots 5, 6, 7 and 8 in Block 38 to the curb line on the East side of Vine Street also beginning at the curb line on West Ninth Street, and from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of Vine Street, along and on the side of Block 52 of the original town of North Platte, to the curb line on the South side of Tenth Street, all in the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of North Platte, Nebraska:

Sec. 1. It is hereby ordered the Mayor and City Council of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska that the following side walks be constructed within the corporate limits of said City as provided by the general side-walk ordinance of said City:

Beginning at the curb line on west "B" Street, and from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of South Vine Street, along and in front of the east side of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 of Block 3 of Miller's Addition to the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, to the curb line on the South Side of "A" Street and beginning at the curb line on the north side of First Street, from thence in an northerly direction along the west side of Vine Street, along and in front of the east side of Lot 8 in Block 177 of the said City of North Platte; also beginning at the curb line of the north side of Ninth Street and running in an northerly direction along the west side of North Willow Street, along the east side of Lots 8 and 1 of Block 50 to the curb line on the south side of Tenth Street; and beginning at the curb line on the north side of Tenth Street, from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of Willow Street, along the east side of Lots 8 and 1 of Block 41 to the curb line on the south side of Eleventh Street; also beginning at the curb line on the north side of "C" Street, from thence in a northerly direction along the west side of Elm Street, along and in front of Lots 4, 3, 2, 1, of Block 3 of South Park Addition to the City of North Platte, Lincoln County Nebraska to the curb line on the south side of "B" Street; also beginning at a line on the south side of East Sixth Street and from thence in a southerly direction along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 137 to the curb line on the North Side of East Fourth Street, and beginning at the curb line on the South Side of East Fifth Street, thence in a Southerly direction along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 110 to the curb line on the north side of East Fifth Street, and

beginning at the curb line on the south side of East Fifth Street, thence in a southerly direction, along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 137 to the curb line on the north side of East Fourth Street, and beginning at the curb line on the south side of East Fourth Street, thence in a southerly direction along the east side of Cottonwood Street, along and in front of Lots 4 and 5, in Block 110 to the curb line on the north side of East Fifth Street, and

All of which sidewalk shall be constructed on a line provided for in the general side walk ordinance of said City and all of said side walk shall be constructed of hard brick, stone flagging, or broken stone, and coarse gravel and cement, and shall be bordered at the edges with permanent material in manner as provided by the general ordinance of said City.

Section 2. That the owners of the lots along which this sidewalk so established by this ordinance, as described in Section One hereof, are hereby required to construct said sidewalk without delay and have the same completed within 90 days from the publication or service of notice as provided by the general side walks ordinance, and if any of the owners shall fail to comply with this ordinance, and notice when given, the city authorities shall proceed with the construction of said sidewalk, at the expense of the delinquent owners of said lots as provided in said general sidewalk ordinance, and the amount of costs and expenses for the construction of said side walk and collection of the same, shall be collected by special assessment or tax levied against the lot or lots along which said City is required to construct the same.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage according to law.
