One of the clerical delegates attending the Presbyterian synod will occupy the pulpit at the Baptist Church next Sunday morning and evening.

The house on the P. E. Burnett farm, southeast of Sutherland, burned to the ground Tuesday evening. L. S. Halstead and family were occupying the place. The household goods were removed.

O. H. Tholecke spent Wednesday at Bignell putting in a mile and a quarter of road and states that the greater part of the work is being done by the residents who thus demonstrate their public spirit and desire for the betterment of conditions.

Members of the Baptist missionary society held an enthusiastic meeting at the church last evening, the attendance being very large. Each member brought in a dollar and told in rhyme how she had earned it. At the close of the meeting refreshments were served.

The proposed new road between Brady and Gothenburg is now assured. Lincoln county will build one mile, Dawson county one mile, and the remainder will be constructed with funds donated by the people of Gothenburg, Vroman and Brady. The road will be constructed under the supervision of a government good roads expert.

While driving across the railroad tracks on the crossing south of the stock yards Monday evening with a load of coal, Fred Gardner was struck by No. 14, which was traveling about forty-five miles an hour. He was pitched forward into the road about twelve feet from the track and received a small gash in the back of the head, some fractured ribs and a badly wrenched back. The wagon was broken into kindling wood, and strewn along the track together with the coal for about a quarter of a mile. The horses were uninjured and broke loose with the front running gear and ran to the Hinkley farm on the south side where they were caught.—Gothenburg Independent.

Fire at Sidney last night destroyed the Union Pacific round house and seven locomotives in the stalls were more or less damaged and will need be sent to the shops for repairs. The building was partly brick and partly frame, the latter consisting of an addition built later than the brick portion.

The origin of the fire has not been reported here, but certain it is that it was not incendiary in the part of strikers, for none of the employes at that place struck.

Doings of the Synod.

Sessions of the Nebraska Synod are now in session in the Presbyterian church. More than one hundred ministers and elders, from all parts of the state, are in attendance and most of them will remain over the Sabbath.

The sessions began on Wednesday with a Sunday School Institute, both state and national workers having part in the program. Wednesday evening the opening sermon was preached by the retiring vice moderator, Prof. A. W. Clark, Ph. D. of Kearney. Thursday morning was given to routine matters and work of the home missions was taken up and occupied most of the day. A most interesting and spirited debate took place in connection with this subject.

Last night the service opened with a musical program presented by the choir led by Mrs. Leininger. This choir is well trained, ably led and is doing excellent work. Dr. R. C. Hughes of Madison, Wis., spoke on christian work in the state universities, and was followed by Rev. E. Morris Ferguson of Philadelphia, with an address on Teaching the Bible. The latter was a striking and eloquent presentation of a great theme. Mr. N. H. Leomis of Omaha was unable to be present, having been called to New York on business. Rev. J. C. Templeton spoke in the afternoon on Caring for the Aged Minister, making a worthy plea for his cause.

This afternoon will be given to the consideration of Foreign Missions. Mr. James B. Wootan, one of the editors of the Bee will be one of the speakers tonight and will be followed by Dr. Robt. E. Speer, of New York. The latter is recognized the world over as an authority on this great department of the

church's work. The ladies of the church are serving dinner daily for the delegates in the parlors of the church. The program for Saturday and Sunday will be of much interest. Dr. Jenks is the speaker for Saturday night. Dr. Lawrence, of Lincoln, and Judge Davidson, of Tecumseh, are on for Sunday night. Probably one of the most popular meetings will be the Sunday afternoon service at which Hon. William J. Bryan will deliver his lecture on The Old Time Religion.

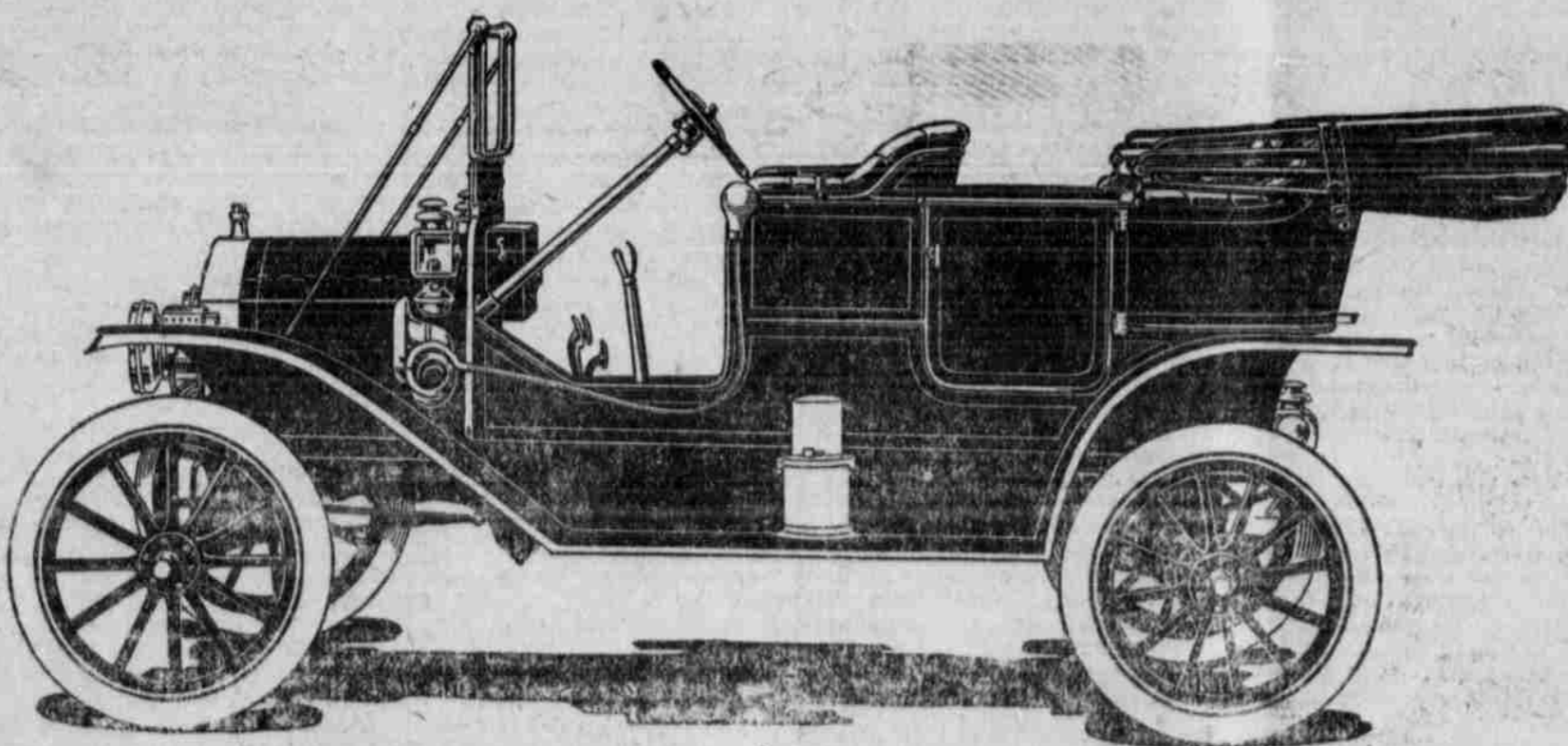
