White and thirty-two others asking and praying for the organization of the proposed North Platte Valley Irrigation District, was presented to the board of county commissioners of Lincoln county, Nebraska, and upon consideration of said petition, the evidence and proof of publication of notice of the time of presenting said petition to said board for hearing, the board of county commissioners, find:

1. That said petition was signed by a majority of the legal voters under the irrigation law in said proposed irrigation district, and by electors who own or hold lease estates, as said term is defined in said irrigation law is more than a majority of the whole number of acres of land in said proposed irrigation district, and that no remonstrances or protests to the organization of said district have been filed.

2. The board further finds that the state engineer of the state of Nebraska has approved the organization of said district and that his approval is now on file in this office.

3. That said petition substantially describes the boundaries of said irrigation district and the boundaries of said proposed irrigation district as described in said petition are hereby established as the boundaries, being in words and figures following, to-wit:
