Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present Walter, Streitz, Roberts and county clerk.

The county attorney is hereby authorized to take legal steps to procure a drainage under the Paxton and Hershey ditch, at a point in the natural water course in S 15, T 14, R 33. This action was taken Oct 24th, but was omitted from the proceedings of that date.

Road petition of Christian Sund, and others for a road commencing at S E corner of N E qr. of S 34, T 14, R 31, running thence north one half mile on section line between S 34 and 35, T 14, R 31 connecting with road No 252 comes on for action. There being no remonstrance or claims for damages and said petition being for a consent road, and the board being of the opinion that said road is for the public good, it is hereby granted, said road to be a continuation of road No 252.

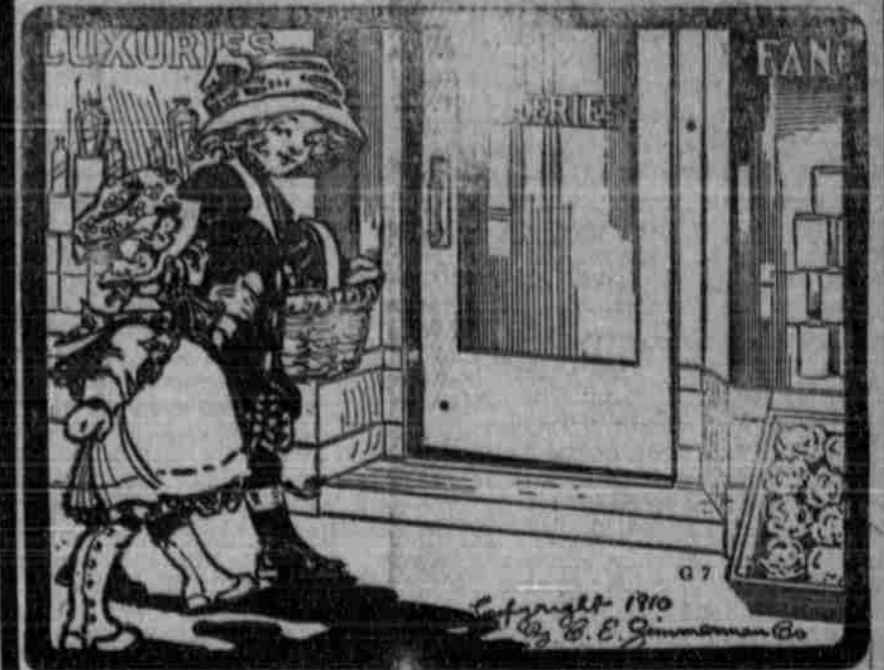
