May Force Roosevelt.

A Washington dispatch dated yesterday says: All attempts to disguise the fact that a concerted movement is on foot looking to the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt as the republican candidate for president in 1912 were apparently dropped today when it became known that members of the national committee were being sounded as to their view of the feasibility of "forcing" the nomination of the former president.

Nine and one-half hours per day and seven days per week is now the rule at the Union Pacific shops in Omaha. According to Union Pacific officials the Omaha shops are working the full quota of men, as are all of the other shops on the system. There is no longer a half holiday on Saturday, but instead the men are working full time every day in the week, including Sundays.—Omaha Bee.

For many years North Platte, one of the big U. P. division points in the western part of the great state of Nebraska, has had an old fashioned barack called a depot. The town deserves a better one, and the Union Pacific promised a new one, but that was long ago, and the promise has not yet been fulfilled, and the people up there are getting restive over the continued procrastination.—Lexington Pioneer.

A Swift Run.

Last Saturday the Los Angeles Limited arrived in North Platte two hours and forty minutes late, when it was discovered that a woman was on the train who was enroute to a hospital at Rochester, Minn., to undergo a serious operation. If the delay was not made up in the 291-mile stretch between North Platte and Omaha the woman would miss connections with the Northwestern to St. Paul and be forced to lay over in Omaha twenty-four hours, thereby risking her life. When this fact was learned the conductor gave the engineer orders "to hustle along," and the trip of 291 miles was made in 300 minutes. Five stops were made, averaging six minutes to the stop, and deducting this time from the 300 minutes the Limited made an average of about sixty-five miles an hour.

Red Cross Seals.

Red cross seals are now on sale at a number of our business houses, and the national association for the study and prevention of Tuberculosis is issuing the following instructions to its fifty thousand paid and volunteer workers engaged in selling the seals, and to the millions who will buy these holiday stickers for use on their Christmas mail. The Post Office Department has approved of the seal design, and they may, therefore, in accordance with order No. 5020 of the post office department "be affixed to the reverse side of domestic mail matter." Red Cross seals must be placed only on the back of letters and not on the address side of any packages going through the mail. They may be placed anywhere on matter going by express. As many seals may be used on the back of a letter or package as may be desired. Everyone is urged to use them liberally, since every seal is a bullet in the fight against tuberculosis.

Care should be used in sending merchandise through the mails not to place seals over the string with which the package is tied, since this seals the package against inspection and subjects it to first-class postage rates.

Red Cross seals may be used also on the reverse side of mail matters sent to Austria, Germany Great Britain and most of the British Colonies except India and Australia. Guatemala, Uruguay and Portugal refuse to admit mail bearing non-postage stamps.

Seals may be used on the face of checks, on bills, on legal documents, and on any commercial paper.

These Christmas seals are not good for postage. They will not carry any mail matter, but any mail matter will carry them. The slogan of the campaign this year is "A million for tuberculosis from Red Cross seals." Every letter or parcel sent out during the holiday season should bear one or more seals.
