The recent cold weather was not without its advantages; scientists tell us that all the disease microbes have been frozen stiff and will not come to life.

"Fighting Bob" Evans, who died at Washington last week, will be kindly remembered by the hundreds of North Platte school children and others who saw and heard him when he made a short talk to the people a few years ago when he passed through here after leaving the war vessels he had taken around the world.

Brother Bryan, who went to Washington to meet with the democratic national committee and to tell them who should and who should not represent certain states on the committee, was vigorously swatted. He denied the right of Colonel Duffy to represent Pennsylvania and the committee knocked out Bryan's plea by a vote of thirty-three to thirteen.

The Rev. Mr. Richeson, of Boston, who betrayed his sweetheart and to escape that publicity which time would bring forth gave her a cyanide pill which resulted in her death, has confessed and has been given the death sentence. He is a villain in clerical garb; while professing his love for the girl he murdered, he was to have been married to another girl a few days following the murder.

While Norris Brown continues to attend to his official duties in Washington in a dignified manner, his friends in Nebraska will see to it that his political interests in Nebraska do not suffer, and that he is accorded the endorsement of re-nomination to the senate. The senator is one of the true progressives who stood for progressive policies in Nebraska when such a stand meant something, and when, in so doing he was compelled to battle with some of the place-hunters who are today hurling the epithet of a 'standpatter' at him.

Vital Statistics.

Vital statistics compiled by State Health Inspector W. H. Wilson show a total of 11,499 deaths and 28,819 births in Nebraska during the year 1911. Divorce statistics for the year 1910 are the latest compiled. They show a total of 11,556 marriages and 1,714 divorces during that year.

The number of deaths during the year 1910 was 1,497 less than in 1911. Of the 11,499 deaths during the year 1911, infantile disease, pneumonia, heart disease, and old age were the cause of more deaths than by any other disease. Outside of these tuberculosis and cancer come next in number and far exceed other disease in number of victims.

One hundred and forty-two persons committed suicide. Thirty-six persons chose the alcohol route, thirty-nine died as the result of surgical operations and twenty-seven were killed by animals. These deaths are not attributed to wild animals, because there are none that are dangerous in Nebraska. It is supposed the deaths were caused by domestic animals.

Fifty-seven persons died on account of poison, 174 died of typhoid fever, 53 of scarlet fever, 8 by lightning, 7 by sunstroke and 2 were frozen to death, 67 of diphtheria, 14 of croup, 40 of whooping cough, 16 of lock jaw, 63 of measles, 222 were killed by accident, 42 died of drowning, 48 by firearms, 4 died of small pox and 6 were murdered.
