The remains will be taken to Sioux City, Ia., tonight accompanied by the husband, and by the mother and a sister, the latter two having been summoned here a few days ago. The deceased was the wife of Dr. Sadler, who has been located in Hershey for three or four years as a practicing physician. Mrs. Sadler was held in very high esteem by the people of Hershey, and her death is deeply regretted.

#### Woodmen to Raise Rates.

"The action taken by the delegates of the convention of the Modern Woodman of America in Chicago in raising their fraternal insurance 47 per cent will directly affect 1,270,608 members of the order," said Nelson Pratt, one of the Omaha delegates at the convention. "It marks the beginning of a safe era in the insurance departments of fraternal orders."

"The new rates become effective for new members May 1, 1912," he said. "Old members have until January 1, 1913, to make their choice of seven optional plans. If they have not declared their preference by that date they will arbitrarily be given the whole new life plan ranging at 75 cents a month to every \$1,000 when 18 years old to \$2 per \$1,000 at 45."

Two indictments, each containing counts of bribery and attempted corruption were returned yesterday at Los Angeles by the county grand jury against Clarence S. Darrow of Chicago, formerly chief counsel for the McNamara brothers. The bills allege that he furnished the money for the McNamara defense fund and bribed Robert Bain, a juror sworn to try James B. McNamara, the confessed dynamiter and murderer, and George N. Lockwood, a venieman.
