Hoagland for State Senator.

W. V. Hoagland, of this city, has filed for the republican nomination for state senator from this district. This action was not wholly volunteer on his part; his decision came after many, both in this county and in other counties in the district, had urged him to again become a candidate for the office. Mr. Hoagland will ask for support on the record he made in the senate at the last session, and that is sufficient. Certainly his work in that body entitles him to re-election. As a senator be was recognized as a leader; he wielded much influence and shaped and secured the passage of a number of excellent measures. He was particularly alert as to the interests of western Nebraska, and through his efforts this section of the state received more recognition than had been given it for many years. We predict Mr. Hoagland's nomination and election will follow.

In an address before the constitutional convention at Columbus, Ohio, Tuesday, Colonel Roosevelt among other things said: "The anti-trust law does good insofar as it can be invoked against combinations which really are monopolies or which restrict production or which artificially raise prices. But insofar as its workings are uncertain or as it threatens corporations which have not been guilty of anti-social conduct it does harm. There should be a fixed goverment policy which shall clearly define and punish wrongdoing and give in advance full information to any man as to just what he can and just what he cannot legally do."

About twenty-five squares in the residence district of Houston, Texas, were destroyed Tuesday morning by a fire which started shortly after midnight and only checked at 10 Wednesday forenoon. Thousands of people are homeless, and the loss will be probably \$6,000,000. Several factories are burned. The fire was impelled by a gale sweeping in its character. Fortyfive thousand cotton bales were burned.

A rather peculiar condition exists in mayoralty contest in Seattle. year ago Hiram C. Gill was removed in disgrace as mayor by the recall system. Tuesday he was re-nominated for the office and received nearly 10,000 more votes than his nearest competitor. Evidently the voters considered they did him an injustice when they voted to remove him from office.

Down in Texas they seem to be getting rid of the negro as rapidly as possi ble. A dispatch from Beaumont states that within a short period of time thirty colored people are known to have been murdered. The number murdered and not reported is probably larger.

It must be a little disheartening and disquieting to Senator La Follette to have so many of his former prominent supporters desert him. If these desertions keep up a month longer the Wisconsin senator will not be in the race as a presidential candidate.

#### William Hubartt Dies.

William Hubartt, for thirty-three years a resident fof this county, died Sunday at Bennett, Col., and the remains were brought here for interment last night. A short funeral service under the auspices of the G. A. R. Post will be held this afternoon.

The deceased was born \$April 9, 1841, in Franklin county, Ind., and later moved to Huntington county, Ind. In January, 1862, he enlisted in Morse's Co. of the 14th Indiana Battery, and honorable discharged March 20th, 1865, at Danphin Island by reason of expiration of term of service.

Shortly after returning ffrom his service with his country he was married to Mary Ann Heart, and in 1871 moved to a homestead north of this city, which was his home unti March, 1904, when he moved to Denver his wife having died June 5th, 1903.

They had seven children, five boys and two girls, four of the boys dying in October and November, 1883, of diphtheria. The living children are Mrs. Ella Knox of Springdale, Mont., and Emanuel and Mamie, of Bennett, Col., at whose home he passed away. There are also two sister living in Indiana.
