Roosevelt Will Accept.

In accordance with a promise made several days ago, Colonel Roosevelt made a reply Sunday night to the joint that he become a candidate for the republican nomination for president. The letter of acceptance is as follows:

"New York, Feb. 24, 1912.-Gentlemen: I deeply appreciate your letter and I realize to the full the heavy responsibility it puts upon me, expressing as it does the carefully considered convictions of the men elected by popular vote to stand as the heads of government in their several states.

"I absolutely agree with you that this matter is not one to be decided with purely from the standpoint of the interests of the people as a whole. I will accept the nomination for president if to this decision until the convention has expressed its preference. One of the chief principles for which I have stood and for which I now stand and which I have always endeavored and always shall endeavor to reduce to action is the genuine rule of the people; and therefore I hope that so far as possible the people may be given the chance, through direct primaries, to express their preference as to who shall be the nominee of the republican presidential convention. Very truly yours,

THEODORE ROOSEVELT." At the national Roosevelt committee headquarters at Washington, of which Medill McCormick is director, the following statement was given out:

"Colonel Roosevelt has no intention whatsoever of forming a third or 'people's party' in the event the Chicago convention fails to name him as the candidate of the republican party. Statements recently made that the former president would take such action are declared without foundation."
