**Sibley Files for Senator.**

Chas. A. Sibley, of Fox Creek precinct, has filed for the republican nomination for state senator from this district, which is composed of Lincoln, Dawson and Keith counties. His opponent for the nomination is Senator W. V. Hosgland, of this city. Mr. Sibley represented the district, or rather the old district, in the legislature four years ago.

**New Overland Train.**

Extraordinary train service between Chicago and San Francisco, via Omaha and Ogden, will be established on May 1, by the Northwestern, Union Pacific and Southern Pacific. It will be known as the New Overland Limited, and will chop four hours from the present running time between these two extreme terminals.

Because of the superior fast service an excess fare of \$10 will be charged between Chicago and San Francisco.

The equipment will be all steel of the latest type of construction. The cars will be lighted from a dynamo. The first car in the train will be a combination dynamo, baggage, cafe, library car, and will contain a barber shop and bath room. Barbers will also act as valets.

Colored women's maid who are experts in manicuring and hair-dressing will be employed. There will also be stenographers who will be carefully selected and trained to give information concerning the points of interest enroute. Stenographic services will be given free.

The city council met Tuesday evening with five members present. Tracy, Herminghausen and Donaldson were unable to attend. The petition of F. H. Thompson and others asking to be taken out of the city limits was withdrawn. A drainlayer's license was granted William Green until March 1st. The usual monthly reports of the city treasurer, clerk and police judge were received. The latter announced that \$32.20 collected from fines during February. The city treasurer's report was \$22,312.50. Clerk Temple's report show the several funds to be in excellent condition. John Frazier was sworn in as councilman in the first ward to succeed W. R. Maloney. A petition signed by thirty-five asking that the question of granting saloon license be left to the people at the next election, was received. The council instructed the clerk to draw a warrant payable to the League of Nebraska Municipalities for the purpose of joining said league. The object of this league is for the purpose of studying municipal questions and distributing information in regard to ordinances. A light was ordered placed on the corner of Elm and A street and a sewer flush wagon was ordered. With few exceptions all bills on file were allowed.
