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Re-elect Officers.

There are over 700 shareholders of the Mutual building and loan association, yet at the twenty-fifth annual meeting held Saturday evening only twenty-two were present, and of the 5000 shares held only 378 were voted. The people of North Platte have nearly \$500,000 invested in the association, yet they do not evince enough interest to attend the annual meeting. While this condition is in a sense an expression of confidence in the management, yet the directors and officers would feel better if the stockholders turned out in full numbers at this annual meeting.

Those present Saturday evening voted unanimously for the re-election of Messrs. Patterson, VonGoetz and Redmond as members of the board of directors, and later when the directors met they re-elected the former officers as follows: T. C. Patterson president, V. VonGoetz vice-president, Saml. Goozee secretary, F. E. Bullard treasurer and Wilcox & Halligan attorneys. Loans of nearly ten thousand dollars were approved and allowed.
