The farmers of the country are getting busy in an organized demand for the establishment of a parcels post. Members of congress are being deluged with letters, petitions and telegrams from agricultural organizations and from individual farmer constituents urging the passage of legislation at this session.

Senator Hitchcock says the democratic party in Nebraska is boss-ridden, referring of course to Colonel Bryan, who is determined that no democrat with a show to be elected shall receive the nomination for president. There is no question but Bryan is in a receptive position; he is not an avowed candidate but he wants the lightning to strike his rod for the fourth time. Senator Hitchcock thinks it is time for Bryan to lay low and give some of the other leaders a show.

It is truthfully remarked by the Kansas City Journal that no system of primary can be devised that can be relied on demonstrate a true party preference because instead of insuring an honest party choice it gives the opposition an opportunity to take part and help the weakest candidate. In other words it is the democrats can throw their support to the nomination of a weak republican candidate with the assurance that at the following election he can be defeated. This mode of procedure has been demonstrated in this state, and was forcibly illustrated in North Dakota last week when thousands of democrats voted for LaFollette.

It is now nearly six years since government and state railroad regulation became an accomplished fact. That policy, it may be remembered, was to be the ruin of the railroads, according to their managers. It is only a year or so since the refusal of the interstate commerce commission to prevent a general increase in freight rates crippled the roads again, as their managers assured us. In view of these successive wounds it is interesting to find through a new rate book of railroad credit that the bonds and stocks of the roads are in remarkably sound condition to this day. John Moody, author of "The Truth About Trusts," has issued an analysis of railroad investments showing that 84 per cent of the outstanding issues of railroad bonds are what might be called double first-class investments for safety. And notwithstanding the vast amount of watered stock known to have been issued, 68 per cent of the stock issues are paying 7 per cent or more. Three-fourths of the railroad stock issues are paying dividends. Obviously, the railroads have been well treated, and have no cause for complaint.—State Journal.

Taft Supporters Confident.

A Washington special to yesterday's Omaha Bee says:—The climax of the republican pre-convention campaign will soon be reached. Developments this week will leave the opposition to President Taft's renomination scattered and shattered. Results in New York, Indiana, Colorado, Mississippi and elsewhere will make the situation clear. The week just ended brought President's convention strength to 143. This week will see it materially increased and by Saturday he will have passed the 750 mark if things go as indications point.

Indiana's action is foreshadowed by the primaries which turned the state convention over to the president's supporters and give him a majority of the districts. New York also has given so many preliminary evidence of its purpose, the New York City republican clubs' unanimous endorsement of the president being the most recent, that a favorable outcome is conceded even by opposition.

Only eight delegates were elected last week, exclusive of the ten in North Dakota, which Senator La Follette easily won at the primaries in a contest with Colonel Roosevelt. Of the eight delegates chosen six were instructed for President Taft, with a contest promised in the case of two and two are pledged to him. The total strength of the candidates is now recorded as follows: Taft, 143; Roosevelt 15; La Follette, 10; Cummings, 2.
