The Society for the Friendless deals with prison reforms, uses its kindly offices for the betterment of convicts, and uses its influences with those who have been liberated after serving a sentence in prison.

Inaugurate Y. M. C. A. Campaign.

A half dozen committees composed of four or five men each today begin a campaign which it is hoped will result in wiping out the indebtedness of the local Y. M. C. A. To assist in this campaign there arrived yesterday E. L. Hamilton, executive secretary of the Y. M. C. A. on the New York Central lines, and W. E. Baskerville, assistant state secretary for Nebraska. Last evening these gentlemen met with a number of our citizens, outlined the plans of campaign, selected the committees, and arranged for beginning the campaign today.

About \$1,000 is needed to pay association indebtedness, and if \$800 is raised by the committees the remaining \$200 will be donated from the Sidney Dillon fund. This latter donation is contingent on our people subscribing the \$800.

The local association, like associations the country over, is not self-sustaining, and to maintain it donations from our people are necessary. It has been about two years since citizens have been asked for subscriptions, and in view of this lapse of time since assistance has been asked, each one interested in the moral upbuild of the city should freely give his share toward wiping out the indebtedness.
