The Late H. T. Crockett. The funeral of the late H. T. Crockett was held Wednesday afternoon from the Baptist church, Rev. Favoright conducting the services. Practically every Grand Army man in town paid the last early respect to their comrade, and at the grave the full G. A. R. ritual service was held, including "taps" by Cadet Schmalzried.

In the death of Mr. Crockett North Platte loses a pioneer citizen and the country a brave defender during the civil war. He was born in Leywell, Va., January 9, 1834. He later removed to Indiana, where he enlisted in Co. A, 46th Ind. Vol., participated in many hard fought battles and was honorably discharged at the close of the war.

He came to North Platte in 1874 and for many years followed the vocation of painter and decorator, and during his long term of residence was a good citizen. Death was due to cancer of the throat, from which he suffered greatly.

The immediate relatives heretofore are his wife, foster son A. C. Howard, of this city, and son John Crockett, of Evanston.
