These passages-at-arms between Roosevelt and Taft are certainly making campaign thunder for the democrats. As a family row furnishes food for the gossipers, so does this factional fight in the republican party furnish meat for the democratic press and spellbinders. It's time to call a halt.

About one-half the voters of Lincoln county voted at the late primaries, the other half were not sufficiently interested to take time to go to the polls. So long as this indifference exists, it cannot be said that primary elections are a success, or that the candidate who receives the highest vote is really the choice of the people. Perhaps through time the voter can be educated so that he will take the same interest in a nominating primary that he does in the election.

The net gain in the membership of the Methodist church last year was 55,000, or two per cent. This small gain has led the church dignitaries to get on their thinking caps. That there is something wrong somewhere is evident. Perhaps an investigation will prove that men of modern views will not affiliate with a church organization that maintains the same rules that existed fifty years ago. Church organizations, like business men must adjust themselves to changed conditions—and these rules can be changed without the church losing any of the influences for good.

The board of bishops, in their annual report to the general conference of the Methodist church in session at Minneapolis, recommend that the rule prohibiting dancing, card playing, gambling and going to theatres, circuses and horse

traces should be abolished, because the American people are too far advanced longer to be restricted by church rules. The bishops say this is a matter to be left to the people to judge for themselves. This recommendation on the part of the bishops is certainly a modern view. If you think it wrong to play cards or dance, don't do it; if you think there is no harm, enjoy these pleasures.

The following resolution was passed by the board to wit: Whereas Birdwood precinct, Lincoln county, Nebr., has on the 9th day of April 1912, voted \$15,000 of Birdwood precinct bridge bonds for the purpose of building a bridge across the North Platte river at or near section line between sections 4, 5, 8 and 9, T 14, R 33 according to law: Therefore be it resolved by the board of county commissioners of Lincoln county, Nebr., being in lawful session, that we hereby make application to the state of Nebraska to furnish one half of the cost of construction of said bridge according to section 90, chapter 78 of the statutes of the state of Nebraska, and we further pledge the county of Lincoln in the state of Nebraska and guarantee one half of the cost of construction of said bridge and fill. Said bridge to be 800 feet long with necessary fill according to the plans furnished by the state engineer. Total cost not to exceed \$30,000.
