To John Marks: You are hereby notified that on the 29th day of Jan., 1912, Susie Marks filed her petition against you in the district court of Lincoln county, Nebraska; the object and prayer of which are to obtain a divorce from you on the grounds that you, said defendant, have without provocation been guilty of extreme cruelty towards plaintiff, and that you, said defendant, have wantonly and cruelly failed and neglected to support said plaintiff.
