Real Estate More, Personal Less.
County Assessor Bacon and his deputy Mrs. Nona Boyer are now footing up the assessment returns of the various precincts. While the total has not yet been ascertained and the official abstract will be not made until the state board of equalization finishes its work, which will be about July 1st, the real estate assessment in practically every precinct, is greater than four years ago, while the assessment of personal property will show a decrease over last year. The raise in real estate is confined exclusively to good farm land—grazing land remaining at the same valuation as in 1908. The falling off in personal property is due to a decrease in the amount of property rather than to a lower valuation.
