Diminishing Railroad Returns. Monthly summaries of the revenues and expenses of the steam railroads of the United States have been compiled Mrs. G. A. Herzog and daughter, of by the Bureau of Railway Economies by the railways with the Interstate from a visit with relatives at Val-Commerce Commission, for the twentypariso. two months from July, 1910, to April, 1912, the latest month for which returns are available. Net operating revenue per mile of line for 'the railways as a whole in comparison with the corresponding months of the previous year decreased in eighteen of these months, and increased in but four. The decrease per mile of line per month was as great in amount as \$53, and as great in ratio as 15 per cent. The greatest increase for any one of the four months showing increases was \$31, or 14.1 per cent. This was in February, 1912, and was exceptional as this month contained one more day than February, 1911. The highest average net operating revenue per mile of line for any one month of this period was \$409, the lowest \$203. Seven of the ten months from July, 1911, to April, 1912, show decreases in net operating revenue per mile of line as compared with the corresponding months of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911; and eleven of the months of the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1911, showed decreases in comparison
