By a vote of 485 to 93 the electors disapproved the action of the city council when on May 22nd it passed a resolution ratifying the transfer of the rights and franchises granted the North Platte Telephone Co., in 1897 to the Nebraska Telephone Co., the recent purchasers of the property of the former company.
