John Weingerger Fatally Stabbed.

A Cheyenne dispatch to the Denver Post, dated yesterday says:

Neil Rowell, assistant superintendent for the Cheyenne Car company, was arrested this morning, charged with stabbing John Weingerger, the Union Pacific fireman, whose home is North Platte and who was attacked on Cary avenue last night, and who is at a local hospital suffering from a dangerous knife wound under the heart.

Rowell admits he had trouble with Weingerger, but says the fireman attacked him as he was walking with Miss Luella Smith, a waitress, with whom both men were infatuated. He denies using a knife on Weingerger.

Miss Smith, who came from Grand Island, says she has known Weingerger for some time, that he is insanely jealous of her and insists upon paying her attentions. She was walking along Cary avenue with Rowell when approached by Weingerger, who, without warning, struck Rowell in the eye and was following up the attack when Rowell, who is a powerful man, fought the fireman off.

She didn't see Rowell use a knife. Rowell was released from custody when the police learned the facts. Weingerger refused to make a complaint against his rival.

As we go to press we understand a telegram has been received stating that John Weingerger died last night.

Fred Kade's Injuries Serious.

A Pomona, Cal., paper received at this office gives particulars of the accident which befell our former resident Fred Kade on Thursday evening of last week. He was on his way home and stepped off the sidewalk close to an automobile standing by the curb and started to walk across the street. He had taken but one step behind the automobile when he was struck by another car which was running about eight miles an hour. He was knocked down and shoved along the pavement for about ten feet and when rescued his body was supporting the front part of the car. He was carried into a store, physicians summoned and later taken to his home. His injuries consisted of a broken collar bone, three broken ribs, a sprained ankle, a bad gash on the right side of his head and a badly bruised hip. It was thought for a time that one of the broken ribs had punctured the right lung, but later this was found not to be true.

A foot note on the paper written by J. M. Beatty and dated Monday says "Mr. Kade felt pretty good yesterday added restfully well last night."

The unfortunate accident is much regretted by Mr. Kade's friends in North Platte and the county.

RAILROAD NOTES AND PERSONALS

A special train filled with South Omaha stockmen enroute to the Frontier celebration at Cheyenne passed through last night.

The steel gang will reach Chappell by the last of the week with the work on the second track. Both tracks are being used as far as the Ralton siding.

Albert LeDoyt, who has been engaged in farming for several months at Paxton, has returned here and resumed service as brakeman, a position which was held previous to going to Paxton.

Total gross earnings of all railroads in the United States making weekly reports show a gain of 6.1 per cent for the month of July over the same period a year ago, according to a statement given in Dun's review. The July gain aggregates \$36,030,098.

District Foreman Beery received notice yesterday of the assignment of six new locomotives to his jurisdiction. These engines are now at Omaha and will be sent here in a few days. They form part of a big order placed early last spring by the Harriman lines.

While in town a few days ago Genl. Manager Scott remarked to Trainmaster Smith that North Platte would have a new round house as a Christmas present. With the round house will be new coal chutes, sand house and other accessory buildings. It is generally believed that these buildings will be placed at the east end of the new yards, probably opposite the west end of the ice houses.

A dispatch from Brainerd, Minn., dated August 14th, says: An authoritative statement was issued here today regarding the secret vote taken by the Federation of Federations of the railway shop employees of the roads west of Chicago. There will be no strike called in sympathy with the Harriman line employees, now out on strike. The vote for a general strike of the Federation of Federations was lost by 451 votes.

A new executive position known as "train rule" examiner" has been created by the C. B. & Q., due to the recent wreck on that road at Western Springs. The new examiner will devote his time to examining trainmen on the rules, to ascertain their familiarity with them, their interpretation, and how they would comply with certain orders under extraordinary circumstances. This work has in the past been done by division superintendents, each of whom looked after the men on his own division, but it has been decided that greater efficiency can be obtained by having the entire road under one man who will travel from section to section to see all the men.
