September starts out with the evident intention of surpassing in warmth the months of July and August. The temperature Sunday was ninety-one, yesterday was a shade less, but this week as a whole promises to equal or surpass any week of last month. Observer Hardin would receive our thanks for a good rain.

Down in Lancaster county, or rather in the city of Lincoln, the wives of the bull moosers have organized and the bull moosers will "let the women do the work," or at least a part of it. The "moosettes"—we presume that is the feminine of moose—will attempt an organization in each of the larger towns of the state.

The bull moosers in Nebraska have been a little slow in making a forecast of the state, but Jasper McBrien, whose enthusiasm generally gets the best of him, made the prediction yesterday that the bull moosers would poll 100,000 votes, the democrats 75,000 and the regular republicans 60,000. For a starter that isn't as bad as we expected from Jasper.

Plans for the new Pennsylvania passenger station and terminal at Chicago have just been made public. The new structure is to cost thirty-five million dollars and will occupy the block immediately west of the present Canal street station. Thirty-five millions is some money for a depot even in Chicago; it is evidence what an American railroad can afford to spend for the accommodation of its patrons.

The automobile continues to be the means of sending people to the great beyond, and the number daily sent increases with the number of cars. The daily press each day records from one to five deaths from this source, and of course there are many deaths that are not recorded. It is probable that an accurate list of the number killed and wounded by the automobile mode the present year would exceed those killed and injured on the passenger trains of the country.

Westward, the good roads expert, who is making a trip from coast to coast with a view of making a recommendation for a national highway route, will reach here next Saturday on his return trip from San Francisco. He went west over the Sunset route and is returning over the Platte valley route. It is understood that the route he endorses will be declared the national highway and it is probable that the next session of congress will pass an appropriation to assist in improving the highway.

The fact that Colonel Roosevelt completely disregards his former statement that he would not be a candidate for a third term; that he declares it will require many years to carry his policies into effect and that most of his supporters in the senate, a few days since, fought against any limitation of the terms of a president may or may not be significant. If they are significant, and the people should choose the Colonel for president, America may see a political machine of the like of which it has not even dreamt.—Grand Island Independent.

In a speech last week Governor Wilson, democratic presidential candidate said: "As a matter of fact nobody ever feared foreign grains and foreign products of any kind would come into competition with the farm produce of the United States." If Governor Wilson thinks "nobody ever feared foreign grains," he ought to come to Nebraska and ask the farmers why they so strongly opposed reciprocity with Canada when it was approved by President Taft. Reciprocity with that country might help the Nebraska farmer as much as it hurts him, but he don't look at it that way.

The parcels post act as finally passed congress follows the zone plan of Senators Bourne and Bristow. Under this bill an eleven pound package can be sent over a first-zone distance of fifty miles for 35 cents, or 150 miles for 40 cents, or from New York to San Francisco for \$1.32, the same rate that is charged in the international parcels post service. To send eleven pounds of merchandise even ten miles by post now we must divide it into three parcels and pay \$1.75 postage. Postmaster Hitchcock expects to have the parcel post act in operation by January 1st.

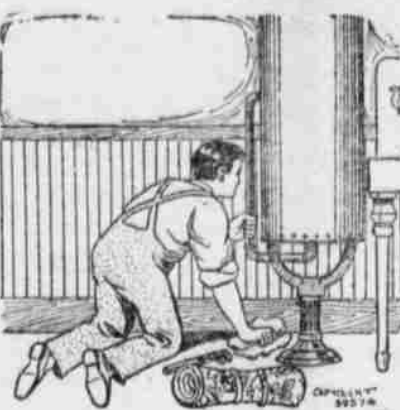

Origin of the New York Yacht Club. Shortly after the Revolution Colonel Stevens purchased Hoboken, which was then an island of swamps and rocky hills, and established the family on Castle point, a beautiful promontory overlooking the Hudson and New York city. John C. Stevens, the father of American yachting, was born there in 1785. There were no ferries in those days, and the Stevens boys of necessity became expert boatmen. At fourteen John C. owned a sailboat of twenty feet length named Oliver. As the years passed by he had the schooner Gimcrack built for him by William Capes in Hoboken. This boat is one of the most historic craft of American yachting, since she was the cradle of the New York Yacht club, the organization being accomplished in her cabin only July 30, 1844, the year in which so many of the world's greatest achievements occurred. On that day John C. Stevens called a meeting of yachtsmen, which assembled aboard the Gimcrack, anchored off the Battery, New York, and here the constitution of the New York Yacht club was drawn up.—Strand Magazine.
