According to the annual report of the county superintendent, the past year the expenditures for school purposes were 141,321.27 Total enrollment was 3,872 between five and twenty-one years of age. Total number of teachers was 290. Total wages paid teachers \$42,195.19.

Political conditions in the state of Maine were overturned on last Monday when the republicans won back the governorship, secured three of the four congressmen, and the legislature on joint ballot will elect a republican United States senator. Two years ago Plated, Democrat, was elected governor by a plurality of 8,000. 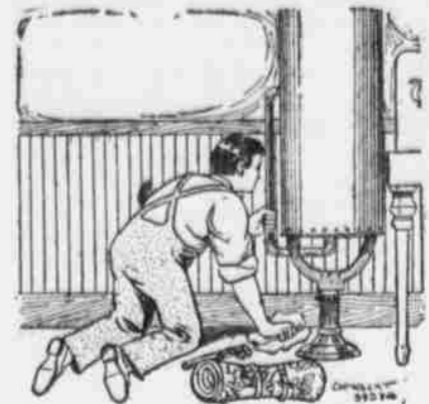
