Rev. Clifton Takes His Bell.

The Kearney Hub of yesterday contained this story of a former Methodist minister of North Platte: When the congregation of the Trinity Methodist church waited for the sound of their bell Sunday morning to summon them to their meeting place they were disappointed in that there was no bell. The bell was purchased by Rev. A. J. Clifton a couple of years ago and installed in the church tower at his own expense.

Last week he was assigned to the charge at Ogalala and it occurred to him that the bell might sound good on the prairies of the western part of the state and help to fill his congregation.

He called his parishoners in Kearney together and announced his intention of either taking the bell or sufficient gold and silver in lieu thereof to install a similar one on the church in his new location.

The congregation remembering the days when they found their way to church unaccompanied by the chimes, rejected the offer and he took the bell with his household goods which were shipped Saturday.

Deaths Due to Worms.

Dr. Pritchard, government veterinarian with headquarters in this city, makes the following statement:

"Held post-mortems on horses belonging to Geo. Wilson, D. H. Wilkinson and S. J. Koch. Found the Strongylus Armatus or the Palisade worm in all cases in sufficient numbers to kill. Symptoms are similar to those caused by the poison mould or fungus on forage this year. By far the greater loss has occurred from the forage fungus though in localities the Strongylus Armatus or Palisade worm causes losses of horses equally as fast. This Strongylus Armatus is no new parasite to the veterinary profession. It occurs here and there at times. The parasite seems to harbor in stagnant water pools and tanks and are taken into the system through drink. Here they harbor the colon and caecum or large intestines, and do their mischief. This Palisade worm seems quite prevalent in the vicinity of Hershey, Neb. The stockmen having this ailment among their horses must treat them or have still greater loss. Even with the best of treatment they must expect some further loss. What percentage of loss they will have even under treatment I am unable to state, but treatment they must resort to. This they should do without delay. Good cathartics and the best agents must be used. Possibly a government veterinarian may be assigned to this locality and if so the stockman can find out by calling up the experiment station at North Platte.


