Banner Sugar Beets.
Dave McConnell, who lives near the O'Fallon school house, has sent to the U. S. land office, samples of the sugar beets grown by him this season. These samples may be somewhat larger than the sugar factory people like to handle, but when it comes to the yield per acre they are a good size for Mr. McConnell. The harvest of the beets now in progress indicate a yield of twenty-seven tons per acre on Mr. McConnell's field, for which he receives five dollars per ton, or \$135 per acre. This shows the result of good land, thorough cultivation and the proper use of water.

Halligan Star of the Game.
In the game of foot ball Saturday between the university and Bellevue college teams the former won by a score of sixty-one to nothing. In its account of the game, the Omaha Bee says Vic. Halligan, of this city, who plays full back on the university team, was the star of the game, making four touch downs, securing the last after a sixty-five yard run. 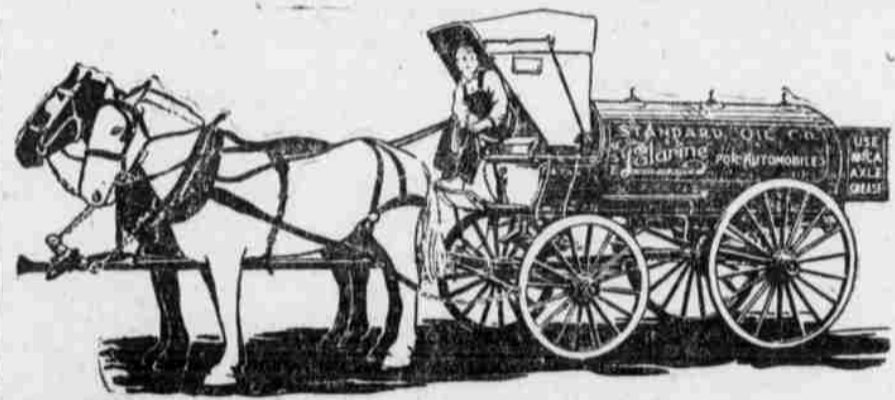
