Crops and Prosperity.

Some opponents of President Taft, of of Republicanism and of the protective tariff imagine they are offering a really clever argument when they derisively assert that the Republicans claim credit for big crops. "Does Taft make the sun shine and the rains come and the crops grow?" They ask, with a broad grin.

Republicans, of course, cannot pride enjoyable time, large, and that weather conditions are can and do pride themselves that whenever the crops are large the producer gets vastly better returns from them under Republican protection than when position as stenographer in the Charles Demogratic policies prevail, with conditions otherwise the same. On the one hand the producer would not get dequate prices because on the other hand, the consumer could not pay for them. It averts inlarge measure the hardship of poor crops due to unfavorable weather conditions.
