In speaking of the Burlington's new line through to the northwest the Lincoln Journal says it will be several years before the line is completed. Several grades must be leveled, two or three tunnels must be bored and a great deal of new grade and track placed in commission before plans will have been carried out. Millions have been spent on the project already and millions more must be used before it will become a reality. It is generally believed that no move toward building the line up the Platte valley will be made until this heavy work in Wyoming is completed.
