**Move for New School Building.**

At a meeting of the board of education Monday evening, the proposition of building a new school house in the east end was considered at length, and as the first step toward its erection, a resolution was passed authorizing the board to call a special election on Dec. 5th to vote on the proposition of issuing bonds in the sum of \$20,000. While this sum is not sufficient to erect a building commensurate with the growing needs of the east end, it is proposed to sell the ground occupied by the present building and add this to the building fund.

A building as large, or larger, than the Washington and Lincoln, is needed, and it is suggested that the east end building be of a different type of architecture, which probably would entail a greater cost than did the Third and Fourth ward buildings.

The school population of the east end demands this new building, and that section of the city is entitled to this expenditure of the tax payer's money. The bonds should carry without a dissenting vote; in fact every good citizen should account it a pleasure to assist in giving the east end people the school accommodations they need.
