Senator Hoagland's Work.

Senator W. V. Hoagland made splendid record in the last session of the legislature. Very few members of that or similar bodies have ever made such a splendid record for effective work, and especially when the member belongs to the minority party.

The senate files introduced by him and

which were passed occupy a considerable portion of the session laws. By Senate files 225, 226, 262, 263, 264,

152, 159, 190, 191, 192, 236, 293, 156, 328 introduced by Mr. Hoagland and which were passed, valuable changes and additions were made in the irrigation laws of this state.

He was also the author of Senate file 175, published as Chapter 184 of the session laws of 1911, providing for the indeterminate sentence of certain .con-victs and for the establishment of a state prison board.

S. F. No. 307 relating to the judiciary, 204 relating to municipalities, and 370 relating to running waters were pre-sented by him and were passed. He was a useful member of that legislature. He is needed by the district and by Western Nebraska in the next legisla ture. He stands with his party for leg-islation which will build up this state and keep it in front ranks of commercial and industrial excellence

Taft Electors on Ticket.

The supreme court of Nebraska at noon Wednesday announced a unanimous decision affirming the action of the district court of Lancaster county in issuing a peremptory writ of mandamus directing the secretary of state to place the names of six Taft electors, chosen

and afterwards deserted the party.
Secretary of State Wait had anticipated the decision and had already begun the preparation and printing of the ballots with the Taft electors at the top under the designation of republican and the bull moose electors at the bottom designated "progressive."

June 15 he asserted that the contest between himself and Mr. Taft for the nomination was a "fight between hon-

esty and dishonesty.

June 15 he issued a statement that rang with the words "theft" and "stealing" and "fraud."

June 16 he issued a statement that rang of "naked theft" of the national committee, and the men who had "earned Mr. Taft's gratitude by stealing for him." ing for him.


