### Ready December First.

Supervising Architect Archer has notified the officials of the U. S. land office that the federal building will be ready for occupancy by that office on December first; though he does not expect that the building will be fully completed by that time, and it is not probable that the postoffice will be moved by that date. The entire third floor will be occupied by the land office; there will be an office for the register, one for the receiver, a general or main office, a large room for holding contests, and a room for storing the records. Two vaults for the storage of the more important records are provided, and all the furniture will be new, this latter including fifty or more filing cases of different sizes and construction.

But little work remains to be completed on the second and third floors of the building, but on the first floor there is much finishing work uncompleted. In order to hurry the work along the contractor has been working his force on Sundays.

### The Big Pump in Place.

The big three million gallon pump recently ordered by the city was placed in position last week, and within the next thirty days will be connected with the wells and placed in service. The new pump is a monstrous piece of machinery, weighing thirty-three tons, is about twenty-five feet long and sets on a concrete foundation that represents tons of cement and sand. While its maximum capacity is 3,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours, it is not probable that within the next few years it will be called upon to furnish its maximum, as during the past season the daily consumption did not at any time exceed one and one-half million gallons during any twenty-four hours, and when the metre system is put in vogue our people will naturally use less water. The new pump will be connected with the thirty-two new wells, and also with the twenty that have been in service, thus giving a water supply from fifty-two wells.

The new wells are nearing completion, and were it not that some of the material has been delayed, the work would have been completed ere this; however, it will require but a short time to finish them when the material arrives. The two new boilers are in place and ready to be fired up at any time. At present steam is furnished by a boiler that the city purchased shortly after taking over the plant, and the boiler capacity is therefore ample for several years to come. In order to accommodate these new boilers, which are somewhat larger than the old ones, an extension of about a foot was made on the east side of the boiler room.

With three new boilers, a new pump and thirty-two new wells, the pumping plant will certainly be in fine shape, and to the credit of the city officials these improvements have been made largely from the receipts of the plant; evidence that the business of the city is being well managed.

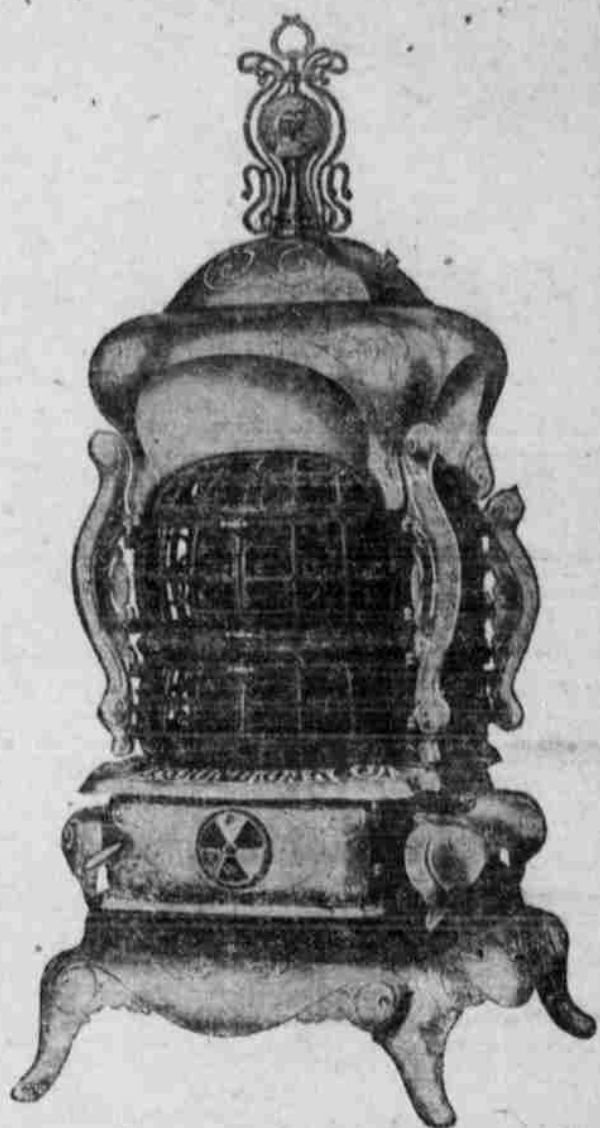
