Sutherland suffered another bad fire last night, in which five or six frame business buildings were consumed. The fire originated from unknown causes in a confectionery store near the center of the block and spread to adjoining buildings, destroying those occupied by the Bonham restaurant, Yates clothing store, Fred Pierson's real estate office, Luckey's clothing store and the Jorgensen hotel. A good part of the stocks of the Yates and Luckey clothing stores were saved.

The fire started about 11:45 and with the strong wind blowing, not much headway could be made with the fire-fighting appliances at hand. The loss will amount to \$10,000 or \$15,000.


