Mrs. Thoelecke Dies.
Mrs. Louis Thoelecke died at her home in Omaha Friday night of a cancerous growth, with which she had suffered for a considerable time.

The deceased was one of the pioneer women of North Platte, coming here about 1871, and remaining until about ten years ago when with her husband she removed to Omaha.
When Mr. and Mrs. Thoelecke first came to North Platte the former engaged in the jewelry business, and later erected the building now occupied by Dixon and conducted his business therein. In the early 80's they moved to a farm southeast of town. Here they lived until a short time before they moved to Omaha.

Mrs. Thoelecke was a most kind and generous woman, a kindly soul whose first consideration was her home and her family; a Christian who showed her faith by her works.
The deceased is survived by a husband, three sons and one daughter, the second son, Otto H. Thoelecke, being a resident of North Platte.
