Income Tax Ratified.

An income tax is now one of the provisions of the constitution.

Wyoming's ratification yesterday of the income tax amendment—the sixteenth change in the constitution and the first since the reconstruction—completed a list of thirty-six states—three-fourth of the union, which have approved the provision.

Congress will now enact a law to levy the tax and it probably will become effective during the extraordinary session to be called by President-elect Wilson in March. The tax itself, its provisions and its limitations are all left to congress.

The new law would supersede the corporation tax and provide for a tax on all incomes above \$5,000, although there has been some sentiment in favor of making the limit as low as \$4,000.
