Found Dead in a Cave.

Word reached the city at noon yesterday of the death of Hugh Bronson, a man about 48 years old, at his home on the Birdwood. Mr. Bronson, formerly lived here and for fourteen years or more was employed in the round house. Two years ago he took a Kin-kadee homestead on the forks of the Birdwood and moved his family there. Last fall he resigned his position with the U. P. company and took charge of the place while his wife and family came to North Platte to give the children an opportunity of attending school. Saturday of last week he transacted business in Sutherland and seemed to be in particularly good health. Two weeks ago his house burned down and since that time he occupied a cave. He was found dead in the cave yesterday morning by some of the neighbors and it is thought he had contracted pneumonia and exposure to the cold caused his death. He was employed by the Bratt Cattle Company on the Birdwood twenty-seven years ago.

He married Miss May Hayes, of this city, who, with four children, two boys and two girls, ranging in age from 4 to 10 years, survive him. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.
