### Railroad Notes.

C. A. Weir and S. C. Meemore have been in Lincoln this week looking after legislation which effects railroad employees.

A special train of Union and Southern Pacific officials will pass west tomorrow or Sunday. They are on a trip of inspection preparatory to the transfer of the Southern Pacific to the Union Pacific.

Engineer J. I. Smith has been elected to an office, not a political one, however; the position is that of director of the Suburban irrigation district, in which district he owns two farms. Jake did not seek the office, it was thrust upon him.

Twelve cars of cattle formed a stock special which came down the branch Wednesday. The cattle were loaded at Gering and in order to get the shipment away from the Burlington it was necessary to make up the special and "hike."

During this session of the legislature 105 railroad bills have been introduced. Some of these have merit, but a great majority are practically useless in view of the fact that these matters can be taken care of by the state railroad commission and the inter-state commission.

The vote of the firemen on the roads east of Chicago, which closed last week, was overwhelmingly in favor of a strike if the roads do not accede to the demands. The question involved is largely one of wages, the firemen now receiving from \$2.50 to \$3.25 per day.

The Chicago Record-Herald of Tuesday contained a notice of the death of Robert Law at Los Angeles. Death followed an operation for appendicitis. "Bob" Law was well known to the older citizens of North Platte. For a number of years he was a resident of this city, stationed here as division superintendent of the Union Pacific. While here he married one of the Dowd girls and built the house on Third street now owned and occupied by F. E. Elliott. Later he was transferred to Omaha as superintendent of the Nebraska division. Several years ago he went to Buffalo, N. Y., as superintendent of the Delaware & Lackawanna road, and later accepted a position with the Burlington. He was sixty-one years of age.

Otis Malcomb Roseburg, of Sioux City, was arrested the first of this week for posing as a mute and obtaining money by begging. Among those who contributed was officer Trout, who later heard the fellow in an argument with some associates in the depot. The case was tried before Justice Sullivan who gave him a jail sentence of twenty days with a bread and water diet every alternate day.
