Educational Announcements.

The announcement for the third annual meeting of the West Central Nebraska Educational Association, to be held at North Platte, April 3, 4 and 5, have been issued by the county superintendent.

State Superintendent Deizell will be present and address the teachers and other well known speakers will be present. Officers for the ensuing year will be elected and good music and entertainment is planned for all. A banquet will be held on the closing day of the meet and a special visiting day with programs will be designated.

Addresses will be given by men and women of state and national fame. The most prominent men and women engaged in school work in the West Central District will take part on these programs either by opening the subjects or carrying on the discussion. They will begin at 10 a. m. central time.

Afternoon sessions will be divided between four section meetings. The High School section will be presided over by Miss Cora O'Connell, principal of the Model high school of the Kearney normal. The rural school section will be in charge of Miss Hulda Peterson, assistant in charge of the boys and girls club work of the agricultural extension department of the University of Nebraska, and Miss Anna V. Day, assistant state superintendent of Nebraska. The primary school department will be in charge of Miss Charlotte Lowe, primary supervisor of the model school of the Kearney normal. The grade section will be in charge of Miss Emma Smith principal of the Lincoln school, North Platte.


