THE three appointees named by Governor Morehead as members of the state board of control were rejected by the state senate Tuesday. This action was largely due to republican votes and was based purely upon political considerations. None seemed to doubt the fitness, honesty or capabilities of the appointees. The action of the republicans therefore seems to have been indefensible, unwarranted, and an affront to the governor that he did not deserve. Honesty and fairness always pays.

By a vote of more than two to one, the ordinance giving the Kearney electric light company a franchise was turned down Tuesday. The ordinance provided for a material reduction in the rates that have prevailed, and some argued that the rates were lower than the city could charge and make interest on a municipal plant, yet the majority was strongly against the franchise. On the first day of April a proposition to issue \$40,000 for a municipal lighting plant will be voted upon.

WEDNESDAY afternoon the state senate passed the Sunday baseball bill and killed the woman's suffrage bill. This shows great statesmanship; we cannot possibly get along without Sunday ball, but the right of women to vote is of little import. Men who make a cross on the ballot, but who could not write their name thereon if required to do so, and who does not own a dollars' worth of property can walk up to the polls with the bearing of a king and cast his vote, while the college educated woman and the woman who has large property interests is an inferior being unworthy the right of suffrage. And these are days and times when men are bowling themselves hoarse for a "square deal". The shams of today give an honest man a very weary feeling.
