THE offers of aid to the stricken people of Omaha, which comes from all over the state as well as from all parts of the country, show that when people are in distress the more fortunate are quick to respond. Under normal conditions we may seem sordid and unsympathetic, but when calamitous events occur our hearts beat warm for the unfortunate.

WE of western Nebraska were appalled at the awful loss of cattle in the blizzard of March 14th, but our misfortune pales into insignificance when compared with the loss of life and property in the Omaha cyclone and becomes more insignificant when sized up with the terrible loss of humanity and property by fleods in Ohio and Indiana. The loss in these states, probably 3,000 lives and property value of fifty millions, is nothing short of a national calamity.

The announcement of the Standard Oil Co, that they will soon put out a new cheaper and better fluid for use in gasoline engines, known as "Motor Spirit' comes with particular pleasure to those who own pleasure and business automobiles. The present price of gasoline is so high as to be a serious consideration in the use of an auto delivery, or the use of a pleasure car, and especially since there seemed to be no prospect of a decrease. It is claimed the new fluid will be more efficient and about half the price.

Plans for the immediate rebuilding of the tgrnado stricken district are being worked out by a big company of Omaha bueiness men. A corporation is being formed to handle the matter in a systematic manner and assist the unfortunates who lost their homes and personal effects. This institution will begin at once the task of at least partially reconstructing many of these homes. A public appeal sent out by the Commercial club says that 642 houses were totally wrecked, 1,666 were damaged and 2,179 persons made home-

Only four million pounds of fresh beef could we spare abroad in the eight months ending with last February, compared with 175,806,649 pounds in the corresponding months of 1907.
