THE offers of aid to the stricken people of Omaha, which comes from all over the state as well as from all parts of the country, show that when people are in distress the more fortunate are quick to respond.

We of western Nebraska were appalled as the awful loss of cattle in the blizzard of March 14th, but our misfortune pales into insignificance when compared with the loss of life and property in the Omaha cyclone and becomes more insignificant when sized up with the terrible loss of humanity and property by floods in Ohio and Indiana.

The announcement of the Standard Oil Co. that they will soon put out a new cheaper and better fluid for use in gasoline engines, known as "Motor Spirit" comes with particular pleasure to those who own pleasure and business automobiles.

Plans for the immediate rebuilding of the tornado stricken district are being worked out by a big company of Omaha business men. A corporation is being formed to handle this matter in a systematic manner and assist the unfortunate who lost their homes and personal effects.

IN voting against the bill reducing freight rates in Nebraska, Representative Stevens of this county explained his vote as follows: Mr. Speaker: while I believe some class freight rates and not commodities, are excessively high, yet I contend after talking with the state railway commission that these rates will be properly adjusted when once they are free from pending court decisions.

Despite the fact that the state asked seven men to spend much of their time for two years in working out the details of a comprehensive workman's compensation bill, despite the fact that the democratic platform written and promulgated at Grand Island last summer loudly proclaimed in favor of workman's compensation and employers' liability laws as one of the pledges it would redeem, the house Wednesday put its stamp of disapproval on a bill embodying the most comprehensive of the measures which have appeared before the legislature, and for the most part because they did not believe in the principle of the bill.

Little longer can we pay for our European tours in corn-fed beef. Only four million pounds of fresh beef could we spare abroad in the eight months ending with last February, compared with 175,805,649 pounds in the corresponding months of 1907. And the cattle exported shrank from 270,219 to 12,656. Imports showed a corresponding increase. Another year at this rate and we shall have no beef at all to send abroad. We might console ourselves with the thought that the growth of manufacturing and the home market has done it. But unfortunately there is a less happy explanation.
