Evans Elected Mayor.

At the city election a total vote of 639 was cast, which is less than two-thirds the full voting strength. Many voters, concluding that Evans would easily win, did not take the time to go to the polls. For mayor, E. H. Evans, the citizens' candidate received 397 votes, while A. E. Bell, the socialist candidate received 242. Evans received 117 votes in the First ward, 81 in the Second, 143 in the Third and 56 in the Fourth. Bell's vote was 70 in the First, 32 in the Second, 39 in the Third and 101 in the Fourth, the latter ward being the stronghold of the socialists. Quite a number voters who were disgruntled with the citizens' nominees for mayor and councilmen, voted for the socialist candidates.

Temple for clerk, Mooney for treasurer and Welch for water commissioner had no opposition. For councilman in the First ward Albert Schatz was elected over Levi Duke; in the Second M. E. Crosby was re-elected and Dr. Drost elected to fill a vacancy; in the Third J. H. Stone defeated J. L. Burke, and in the Fourth Frank Martin, socialist, was elected over Theo. Lowe, Jr.

For members of the board of education A. F. Streitz and Dr. W. J. Redfield were elected without opposition.

Obituary.

Richard Edmiston Riggs, the youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Riggs who resided at 1093 West Third street, departed this life shortly after noon of April 1st, 1913.

On Aug. 3rd, 1911, the little fellow launched his frail bark upon the seas of life, and after a battle against disease, he was compelled to give up the struggle here, and answer the summons of the Divine Pilot.

He leaves to mourn his loss, a father and mother, a brother and a sister, and the several relatives and friends of the family. A short funeral service was conducted Tuesday evening at the cemetery by H. G. Knowles, pastor of the Christian church. The sympathy of the entire church is extended to the bereaved parents at this time.

DOWN at Lincoln the house members who voted against the committee report on the workmen's compensation bill, and thus work on record against a platform pledge of both the republican and democratic parties, made a frantic effort Wednesday to correct the record. They tried to secure favorable consideration of another bill, which allows an injured workman, after such injuries, to elect whether they will remain under the law or bring a damage suit in court, and which in the latter case would deprive the employer of the common law defenses. The bill was drafted by personal injury attorneys. It was defeated by a vote of 54 negatives to 65 affirmatives, most of the affirmatives being those who were on the negatives on the other bill.

The legislature declined to pass a bill appropriating \$125,000 for a Nebraska building at the Panama exposition. We are inclined to commend the legislators for their act. Nebraska needs advertising, but we question the good results to be obtained from such an expenditure at San Francisco. It is from the eastern states we must get our new settlers and farmers; it is in that section we should spend our money for advertising purposes.

W. H. KNAGGS, who was elected mayor of Kearney Tuesday rode into office on an "economy" platform, one of the planks of which declared that he would not drag the streets nor allow them to be sprinkled in the residential districts. Evidently Kearney has secured a mayor whose economy surpasses his progressiveness.

In seven towns in Nebraska Sunday baseball was one of the leading issues in the Tuesday election. Six of the towns voted to have Sunday games.
