North Platters at Long Beach.
Long Beach, Calif., Feb. 27, 1913.
Dear Mr. Editor:
It occurred to me that some of our readers would be interested in knowing of a gathering of North Platte people in far off California a few days ago.

On Tuesday, March 25th, while the people of Omaha were searching in the ruins of their former beautiful and comfortable homes for victims of the fierce tornado which mowed a frightful path through their city, and while thousands in Ohio and Indiana were praying for rescue from the awful floods which were devastating their states, a goodly number of former and present North Platters were picknicking in the open air on the sandy beach at Long Beach within forty yards of the waters of the broad Pacific. I will try and give you an idea of the setting of the picture. The tables were set in the open air on the famous long beach which gives the city its name, which stretches for four miles along its southern limit. To the southeast the long pleasure pier reaching nearly a quarter of a mile out in the ocean. Directly south the blue expanse of the greatest of oceans stretching beyond the limit of vision.

Slightly to the southwest across the channel nearly thirty miles away beautiful Santa Catalina Island reared her sharp peaks. Circling and looking seven miles across the bay could be plainly seen the little city of San Pedro, nestled at the foot of the Palos Verdes hills. Behind us to the north the beautiful home city of Long Beach with her 25,000 permanent population (not tourist) the most prominent objects in view being the immense \$2,000,000 plant of the Southern Calif. Edison Co., the Salt Lake Bascule Bridge over the Long Beach harbor entrance, the great Craig ship building yards with two great ships under construction and the palatial Hotel Virginia in the near foreground. In the near back ground north of the city the delightful suburban residence districts of Los Cerritos Heights and Signal Hill, overlooking the whole beautiful panoramas, while back of all in the clear distance from north to east loomed in succession the great ranges of the Sierra Madre, the San Bernardino and the San Jacinto mountains.

Standing on the pleasure pier after our picnic dinner we could see at our feet the bathers frolicking in the surf in Old Ocean, and turning half around and raising our eyes could see with

marvellous distinctions Old Baldy and his glistening top and other snow capped summits of the San Bernardino range. Though weakly described, how do you like the picture?

The picnic was very impromptu and hurriedly prepared for and many received notice of it too late to arrange to attend. Nevertheless it was most delightful affair and some thirty odd people who have at some time lived in or near North Platte sat down to a bountiful table and afterwards spent a most enjoyable day in renewing old friendships and taking in the sights of this incomparable beach resort.
