The recent "spick-and-span" campaign in Spokane resulted in the removal of 3,650 wagon loads of refuse in one day from back yards and alleys. North Platte needs a "spick-and-span" campaign; there may not be 3,650 wagon loads of refuse that should be removed, but there are several hundred.

State Food Commissioner Herman has issued an order to all bakeries of the state that all bread must be wrapped in loaves separately in sanitary packages. The unsanitary conditions in which bread has been delivered in the past in arms and in other ways was mentioned in connection with the new order.

A progressive statesman down at Washington has introduced a bill providing for an investigation of the base ball trust with a view of emancipating the "base ball slave." That's proper. Fellows like Ty Cobb who receive \$12,500 for six months' work, or Frank Chance who receives \$25,000 for the season, ought to receive some protection from the rapacity of the base ball magnates.

Final appraisal of the estate of John Jacob Astor, who went to his death on the Titanic, fixes the value at \$87,216,691. This is approximately \$10,000,000 more than the tentative appraisals and the assessed valuation indicated the estate to be worth. The share of the estate which passes into the hands of William Vincent Astor, the first American member of the family to hold his legacy absolutely and without the intervention of trusts, amounts to \$65,668,547.
