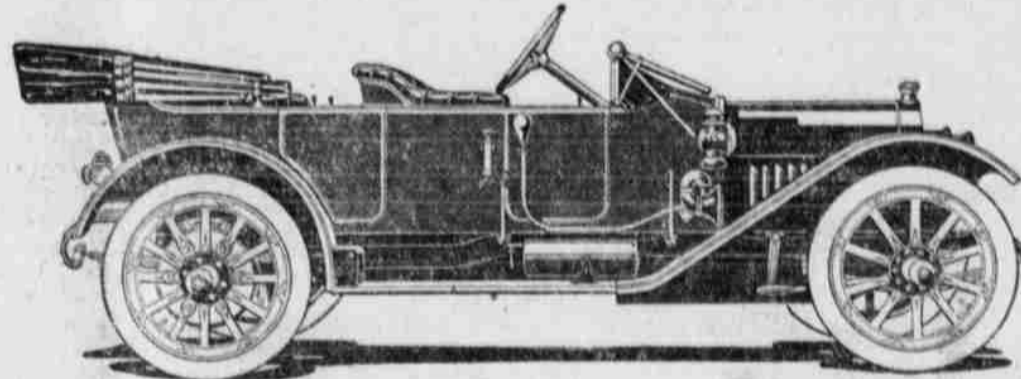

The efforts of the Chamber of Commerce to secure the installation of the electric system of street lighting has so far progressed as to practically insure the operation of such a system before the end of 1913.

### Annual Meeting and Banquet Big Success.

The annual meeting and banquet of the Chamber of Commerce last evening brought together 120 business and professional men and others who favor the forward movement in North Platte. It was the largest gathering of its kind ever held in North Platte, and the interest shown augurs well for the success of the Chamber of Commerce next year. The menu served by Caterer Hupfer was of the kind that satisfies the inner man, it was well prepared and expeditiously served.

Following the spread treasurer E. H. Evans made a report showing total receipts of \$2,800 and disbursement of \$2,300, leaving a balance on May 19th of about \$500, part of which, however, has been pledged for advertising the Junior Normal and memorial day expenses.

Secretary Crosby followed with a detailed report of the avenues through which the funds had been distributed. Included in these expenditures were donations for entertaining the firemen's convention, for band concerts, advertising the junior normal, entertaining the teachers' convention, ascertaining cost of rehabilitating the south side ditch, memorial day expenses, and tornado sufferers in Omaha and other points in the state. He outlined the work of the Chamber of Commerce in securing new industries for North Platte, in improving roadways leading to the city, and in furthering the electric system of street lighting, all of which showed that the organization had been active in its work for the upbuilding of North Platte.

It was then announced that subscription cards for the publicity fund would be distributed, and the total amount subscribed by those present was \$1,238; this will be increased about \$1,000 more by those who were not present. At the same time fifty-six renewed their membership in the Chamber of Commerce.

President Seeburger announced that an election of nine directors by ballot would be made, but upon motion of Mr. Patterson the eight directors now resident who served last year were re-elected viva voce, and upon motion of Judge Hoagland, Mr. Patterson was elected as the ninth director of the board, succeeding F. H. Garlow who was a member last year.

The meeting then adjourned. The directors will meet Thursday and elect its officers, thus organizing for the coming year's work.

The county commissioners convened in session today and will transact such business as is on hand or may be brought before them.

### The New Model

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This model represents the last word in corsetry, being procured after the spring catalog went to press.
