

### Badly Injured By the Kick of a Horse

A man by the name of Ray Haugeland, who had been employed on the Sandburg ranch southwest of Sutherland, was brought to town Tuesday night by Dr. Dent suffering from injuries from a kick of a horse, and is now at the St. Luke's hospital for treatment. The blow from the horse struck Haugeland square on the point of the chin, breaking and crushing the jaw bone, badly lacerating the flesh and knocking out the teeth. The force of the kick jarred and loosened both jaw bones back to the ears, making injuries that are very painful and difficult of medical treatment. When Dr. Dent arrived at the Sandburg ranch he found the young man in a rather critical condition, weakened from the loss of blood and suffering intensely. He was rushed to town in Haugeland's car, and the Doctor worked over him nearly all night.

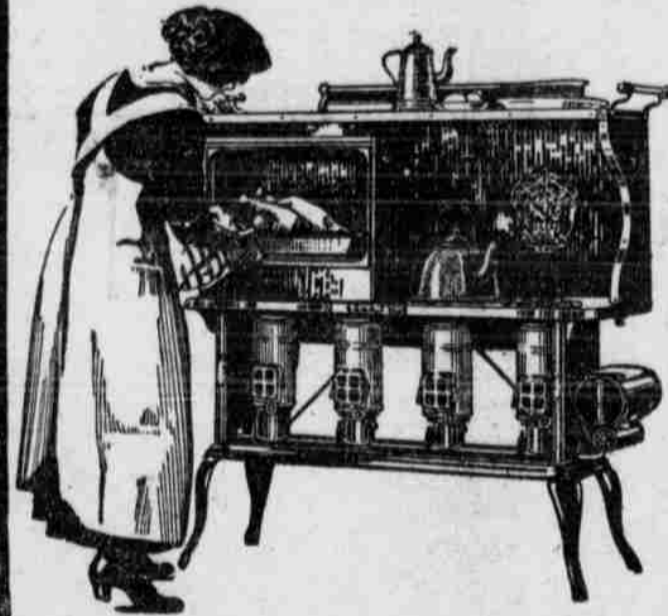
