Memorial Day Observed.

There was almost a complete cessation of business in North Platte Friday and the day set apart in honor of the soldiers dead was fittingly observed. The resting place of the departed soldiers in both the city and Catholic cemeteries were strewn with flowers by the G. A. R., W. R. C., and friends and the usual G. A. R. service held over the grave of C. T. Robinson, the last member of the Ppst to die, and the service of the W. R. C. was to the unknown dead.

In the afternoon a large audience attended the service at the Keith, the address being delivered by Judge Hoagland, and the music furnished by the pupils of the schools under the direction of Prof. Garlich. One feature of the latter was a camp scene, the children singing "Tenting on the old Camp Ground."

The usual large crowd attended Memorial day exercises at Ft. McPherson national cemetery Friday, between 1200 and 1500 being present. Nearly 200 automobiles were counted, these cars belonging to farmers and residents of Maxwell, Brady, North Platte and Gothenburg. The services were in charge of Supt. Ingles and T. C. Patterson, and the address was delivered by Rev. Knowles of this city. Flags and flowers were placed on the graves of the 800 or more soldiers buried in the cemetery.
