**Demand for Beef
Exceeds the Supply.**

The demand for beef far exceeds the supply and high prices are the result, says a bulletin issued by the Department of Agriculture. The shortage in the supply of meat-producing animals, is steadily becoming greater, and the country is warned that it is facing a period of short production of meat. In the last six years there has been a decline of more than 30 per cent in the number of beef cattle in the United States, according to the department, and already during the first three months of this year there has been a decrease of 15 per cent in the number of meat animals killed under government supervision when compared with the same three months of 1912. Estimates of the department give the number of beef cattle in the United States on January 1, 1907, as 51,566,000, and at the beginning of the present year as 36,030,000. Prices paid for cattle, sheep, lambs and hogs last year were much higher than the preceding year. "The year 1912," says the department, "was a year of high prices for all classes of food animals." With the diminished production in the

home market, the department declares, there is no longer a surplus for export. "The time has come," it says, "when we must conserve our meat supply."

C. M. Reynolds, for seven years postmaster at Sutherland, retired last Saturday and was succeeded by Frank Cox. Mr. Reynolds sent in his resignation several weeks ago. The office pays about \$1,100 per year.
