

Fourth of July Weather.

As North Platte is planning a big elebration, naturally we are all intersted as to the weather we will have on that day. The accommodating officer at the weather bureau, Mr. Shilling, has looked up the records of the office for thirty nine years past, and finds that on sixteen of the thirty-nine Fourths we have had rain, the heaviest having occurred on July 4, 1897. Last year we had about one-fourth of an inch. He finds the hottest Fourth we have ever had was in 1877, when it registered 102, and Bill McDonald and Bill Woodhurst, who were then boys, say it was so hot that the collection of fireworks, which were recklessly exposed to the sun's rays, were ignited and exploded in a heap thus robbing the people of the exhibition at night. The coldest Fourth was in 1903, when the temperature dropped to forty-seven degrees.

Of course you can't tell to a certainty what the weather will be next Friday, but from the records of the past it will be either hot, temperate or cool and either dry or wet.
